### **NEW JERSEY TURFGRASS EXPO 1995 CRITIQUE**

To sum up Expo 1995 simply is to say that it was the most successful Expo ever. There were a record number of exhibitors, booths, and attendees. Since it was our third year in Atlantic City, we were able to run the smoothest show yet. When looking at the three major aspects of a successful convention, education, exhibits, and social interaction, the educational program and exhibits continued to work well. It even appears that we hit the right combination of speeches and entertainment at the banquet this year.

### **Exhibits**

There were 118 exhibitors in 207 booths. Almost every booth on the original floor plan was sold, and we added another nine booths to accommodate late exhibitors. The traffic on the show floor was heavy on Tuesday and Wednesday, but fell off on Thursday due to the weather and the fact that the golf people had been at Expo since Monday.

Except for the door prizes, the incentives worked well. The availability of food and beverages on the show floor is essential to attract attendees and should be expanded in 1996. It is apparent that the door prizes as such should be dropped, and we need to consider alternatives in this area.

We are already receiving responses to our request for early sign-up for the 1996 Expo. It is hoped that half of the exhibitors will be signed up, assigned booths, and exhibits paid for by the end of July. The 1996 exhibits will most likely be in a new arena that the Taj complex is building this summer as part of an expansion project.

### Registration

Although fine tuning is in order, we seem to be getting a handle on this aspect of Expo. Registration this year ran smoother than it has in the past, and I am confident that we are on the right track. I don't know if we can ever make a "fool-proof" registration form.

### **Educational Program**

The educational program continues to be excellent. Once again, Ed Milewski and the educational committee came up with a program for a regional show that even a national show would be hard pressed to match.

One minor problem developed when we planed a three hour segment for the Athletic Field session, but only assigned it to a two hour time slot. The GCSAA seminar was a popular addition to the program. It's time slot (Monday), however, may have been one reason that attendance on Thursday was less than usual. We should consider whether this seminar should be scheduled for Tuesday or Thursday in 1996.

The Landscape Architects have expressed a positive interest in using Expo for their conference needs. With a little promotion, it appears that we can accommodate them. The arrangement we had this year with the Irrigation Association worked out well. We will strive to continue this arrangement in the future, and they will have a representative on the educational committee from now on.

### Banquet

I think that we can proclaim this year's banquet a success. We seemed to hit on the right combination of awards and entertainment. Now that we have developed a good base with which to work, we can improve the banquet at future Expos.

The awards luncheon that had been held at Expo in the past was held as an awards dinner at Rutgers in November, 1995. This new venue was very successful.

### Taj Mahal - Hotel and Conference Setup

In spite of early concerns, all of our dealings with the new conference representatives from the Taj ran very smoothly. I can only say positive things about the Taj staff.

### **Guide Book**

The Guide Book/Directory continues to improve, and I think it will get better each year. Everything ran smoothly with the book, even though Bruce Nagy became ill during its completion. This is a testament to our Associations' ability to work as a team.

### **Promotions**

The promotions this year worked well. If Expo is to grow, however, we need to continue to improve and increase our promotional work. For example, we need to increase our attendance from Delaware, Maryland, and Pennsylvania.

### Hospitality

The expanded hours of our hospitality suite were a hit. Many of the speakers and other VIPs took advantage of our hospitality room on Monday and Tuesday evenings. Syd Dickison did a good job organizing the room both nights. The present format is working well and should be used again for Expo 1996.

### **Turfgrass Booth**

The new setup that we used to run our booth worked well, and the old equipment displays generated considerable interest. We should continue to use both of these formats in 1996. We should be able to construct another display of equipment with out any duplications for 1996.

Expo 1996 will be held on December 10-12, 1996. Since we may be in a new arena, we will be working closely with the Taj staff to keep abreast of any changes.
